Calgary's senior population is growing. Affordable housing options are shrinking. Action is needed.

- No new affordable housing for seniors has been developed in Calgary since 1992. Accommodation that is available is not designed to permit aging in place and is not 'senior friendly'.
- The Kerby Centre fields 1,200 calls per month from seniors seeking affordable housing in Calgary.

What is being done?

- Trinity Place Foundation of Alberta (TPFA), established in 1974 to provide affordable accommodation for seniors, has grown to the largest provider of self-contained seniors' housing in Calgary, with over 900 suites in the city.
- **TPFA has acquired land and is finalizing funding for the construction of a 42 unit low rise building in southwest Calgary. One and two bedroom units will be available in this new GLENWAY GATE development.**

How is Faithful City involved?

- The Very Reverend Robert Pynn of Faithful City is the Board Chair of TPFA, where he works as an advocate for seniors and their unique needs.
